The Head Teacher of this small isolated school deserves much credit for the work she is doing, practically single-handed, with 31 or more children from 3^{1/2}-13 years old. The Monitress, who joins in the children's games well, and is always occupied, has no real understanding of teaching, & a more experienced teacher should be appointed. The attainments of the children, in spite of a serious shortage of graded & progressive Readers, seem to be up to the average, but the actual handwriting should be better formed. The Head Teacher has decorated the room with some pictures & children's drawings, & the general impression obtained at these visits was that the children are alert and interested, but that the Infants are not being suitably taught.
